
St.Mary in Charnwood, Nanpantan Roll of Honour

The author is not related to any of the men named and no known living descendants known at commencement. There has been a lot of detective work and assumption in carrying out this research. Invariably errors may occur, despite measures to prevent such occurrences.

Where multiple data exists for a person of the same name it has all been listed and left to future readers / researchers to elucidate which goes together.

Preface to Second Edition

The earliest record, of a Roll of Honour at St Mary in Charnwood, is in the 12 May 1922 edition of the Loughborough Echo, whose editorial records "surprise at 62 men from the parish served in the Great War" as "1911 census population was 316".

Since the publication of the first edition in 2012, a couple of errors in the first edition have come to light as the research has progressed. A number of digital versions have been circulated during the evolution of the manuscript. All known errors have been corrected in the second edition.

Military Wills were normally written on page 13 of a soldiers pay book and torn out when he went up the line for the first time, which is why they survive. The dates on some Wills of the Nanpantan men seem to dispute this assumption.

St.Mary's Roll of Honour Project

The original project aim, in 2010, was to find out some background, not a "family history", to the 63 named men who went from Nanpantan to serve in World War 1. Their names appear on a framed illuminated list at the back of St. Mary in Charnwood. Originally sited on the West wall, the Roll of Honour was reframed and moved to South wall, out of direct sunlight during church reordering in 2013.



Loughborough Monitor (11 May 1922 Edition)

Records the unveiling of Nanpantan War Memorial, with an image of the Memorial, recording an honour guard of ex-service men under the charge of Sgt A Angrave.

War Diary

Alfred kept a personal war diary. Serialised on twitter (website) by the Loughborough Echo, 100 years on, from 29 Jan 1915 – 13 Oct 1915; when he went over the top on the Hohenzollern Redoubt, in northern France (The same action that saw Lt. Howard James Harding Moss, killed in action). Alfred's war ended with a bullet wound fracturing his right arm. Wednesday, December 8th, 1915 was the last diary entry "Admitted to V.A.D Hospital Whittlesford Cambridge". Eventually making it back to his Nanpantan Reservoir Keeper's cottage.

Echo obituary 29 Nov 1918 - Went to France in February 1915, served at the front 3 years & 7 months. He was engaged in storming the Hindenburg line where a shell fragment struck and he succumbed to the wounds a few days later. He lived in Woodhouse Eaves prior to the war and had served in the Boer War with the Leicestershire Volunteer Service Company.

From Garth Butler (Charles Angrave Grandson)

Edwin was CSM in the 1st/5th Leicestershire Regiment, but during the Boer War he was in the Leicestershire Volunteer Service Company, he was awarded the French Medaille Militaire. He was killed whilst at HQ when struck by a shell, he died of wounds on Saturday 5 October 1918.

100 Year anniversary of Edwin Angrave death is reported. Information used to compile came from this work, other research of family history (siblings not recorded above / parents wedding etc) and regimental diaries.

The Project Gutenberg EBook of The Fifth Leicestershire, by J.D. Hills

29 Sept 1918:

"They reached their objective and put outposts round the Mill and along a sunken road to connect with "A" Company. The protective barrage was still in front of them, and through it, in the direction of Levergies, could be seen several German batteries limbering up. One was quite close. This was too much for C.S.M. Angrave and Serjeant Tunks, who collected some twenty men and, regardless of the barrage, took advantage of the cover of a sunken road running East, and pushed forward. They could not cross the open, but, using their rifles, drove off the gunners and killed the horses, so that the battery remained in our hands."

2 Oct 1918:

"The enemy was fairly quiet, except for one field gun, 2,000 yards away on our extreme right, beyond Sequehart. C.S.M. Angrave kept sniping at the gunners, who replied to each of his shots with a whizz-bang."

"Our casualties during the afternoon included one who could ill be spared. A direct hit with a shell on "C" Company Headquarters wounded C.S.M. Angrave in the back. He died a few days later. One of the original Territorials, he had served with us the whole time, and even four years of France had failed to lessen his devotion to "C" Company."

Mr. George Angrave and his wife Ann of Nanpanton received official notification that their son, Edwin Angrave 1/5thBattalion Leicestershire Regiment whilst attacking the Hindenburg Line was struck by a shell fragment and died from his wounds on October 5th 1918. He was 38 years old. On the outbreak of war he enlisted in 1/5 Leicester's, and went to France in February 1915. He served with his unit for 3 years and seven months. Company Sergeant Major Angrave was awarded the French Medal Millitaire for good work in the spring of 1918. Prior to the war he lived at Woodhouse Eaves and was well known and respected. He also served in the Boar War with the Leicestershire Volunteer service Company.



It spent much of its time with the Grand Fleet reinforcing the patrols near the Shetland and Faeroe Islands and the Norwegian coast where she captured a German merchantman on 6 August. On 18 June 1915, Roxburgh was part of a force of cruisers, that set out from Rosyth on a patrol across the North Sea. The force was attacked several times by German submarines, and Roxburgh was hit in the bow by a single torpedo from SM U-39 on 20 June 1915, she to return to Rosyth under her own power. The ship was under repair until April 1916.

Francis Gibbins he survived the war and was called up aged 40 to fight in the second war. He was fighting alongside his nephew, when he was captured at Tobruk. He remained a prisoner for the rest of WW2 but did make many escape attempts. Frank returned home weighing 5 stones. With his wife Evelyn they ran a post office at Sutton Bonnington until his health gave way. He died as an "old man" aged only 64 but a physical wreck.

The Gibbins' also served in the Leicestershire Yeomanry. He and his brothers were very fine horsemen and looked splendid in uniform.

From Dennis Gibbins (Son of Francis)

Born 30 May 1900. Was in the Royal Artillery enlisted as a Gunner. In WW2, he enlisted again, giving up his job and tied cottage. He was captured at Tobruk, Libya. As a prisoner of war he was taken to Italy and then on to Germany In 1911 he was presented with the book "Tom Brown's School Days" by Thomas Hughes, from Nanpantan Council School, for *Progress and Good Conduct*.

On the night of 9th /10th Sep 1915, the 1st Battalion Leics moved into the frontline trenches at Wieltje, Belgium, relieving the 1st EAST YORKS. Once in the trenches they were subject to heavy bombardment all day with several time frames of note highlighted in the diary e.g. 04.35-06.35 & 07.15-08.45. The bombardment consisted of high explosives & shrapnel shells and trench mortars of all calibre, "causing fearful damage to our trenches". The diary records, but not names, some men killed, wounded and many men buried but rescued – not sent to hospital! It is not clear if the not sent to hospital applies to all casualties or just the buried men.

 11^{th} , 12^{th} , 13^{th} are described as "quiet days" with a couple of wounded / sick each day. 14^{th} Sep Heavy bombardment again on B company trenches – 12 killed. Relieved to reserve trenches on 15^{th} Sep, by 1^{st} West Yorks.

Notes

Likely brought up to the line, on the 12^{th} as replacement and wounded on the 14^{th} Sep, based on the battalion diary.

Loughborough Echo (18 Sep 2015 Edition)

Herbert and Edith had two children: Herbert C. Flint who died soon after birth in 1912, and Edith M. Flint born in 1913.

Herbert enlisted at the end of 1914 or early 1915 and joined the 1st Leicestershire Regiment as Private 16413. After training he went to France on April 8, 1915, to join his battalion which was in Divisional Reserve in billets at Armentières, not far from Lille.

For most of April, Herbert was alternately in the trenches at Rue du Bois, where the battalion was subjected to shells and rifle fire, or in billets. At the end of April, the battalion marched to Bailleul, where the men were inspected by Mr Asquith.

On May 1 they marched to Poperinghe and joined the 6th Corps. For most of June and July they were active in the trenches in the Wieltje-Ypres area which were heavily shelled.

On the last day of July there was very heavy fighting at Hooge and the battalion was moved to the edge of the Zillebeke Lines and subsequently to the Rampart Line at Ypres, where again there was heavy shelling, and to Canal Bank.

On September 20 there was a very unfortunate accident at Canal Bank when, during an instruction period, a Bethune bomb exploded while being assembled.

Two men were killed and seven were wounded, including Herbert Flint.

Herbert died from his wounds on the same day.

Reports death, under casualty list.

Records Howard James Harding Moss as a fallen member of Longcliffe Golf Club. According to old membership books 1910-1948, discovered in early 2015.

Loughborough Echo (23 Oct 2015 Edition)

Records the 100 year anniversary of Howard James Harding Moss death with details in this record.

28 Aug 1915:


"We eventually reached the line, and relieved the Lincolnshires in Trenches "49" to "A3." The 3rd Division had now taken "A4" to "A7." Three days later 2nd Lieuts. H. Moss, N.C. Stoneham and C.B. Clay joined us, and were posted to "A," "D" and "B" Companies respectively. At the same time 2nd Lieut. J.D. Hills was appointed Brigade Intelligence Officer, a new post just introduced by General Kemp."

1 Sept 1915:

"The officers themselves had two miraculous escapes. First, 2nd Lieuts. Tomson and Moss were sitting in their dug-out, when a 5.9" dud passed straight through the roof and on into the ground almost grazing 2nd Lieut. Tomson's side. These two then went round to wake Capt. Hastings, who was resting in another dug-out, and the three had only just left, when this too was blown in, burying Capt. Hastings' Sam Browne belt and all his papers."

13 Oct 1915: Little Willie trench on the Hohenzollern Redoubt, Battle of Loos. "Keeping his platoons more together and on a smaller frontage, Captain Hastings decided to attempt a bayonet attack against the German opposition on the left of the Redoubt, and himself led his men up to the attack. Again Platoon Commanders were the first to fall, and as they climbed out of our trenches, 2nd Lieut. Lawton was mortally wounded in the stomach and 2nd Lieut. Petch badly shot through the arm. However, this did not delay the attack, and the Company, crossing the German front line, quickened their pace and made for the junctions of "Little Willie" and "N. Face." Once more bombs and machine guns were too hot for them, and first Capt. Hastings, then 2nd Lieut. Moss were killed near the German second line,"

Howard James Harding Moss died on 13th Oct 1915, age 19, in a bayonet charged assault on the German lines "Little Willie trench on the Hohenzollern Redoubt, Battle of Loos", falling near the German second line. Only 91 of 1308 known to have died in this assault by the 46th (North Midland) Division (TF) have a known grave. On what was to be the last day of the "Battle of Loos".

The whole of division comprised of Territorial Regiments, comprising of units from Lincolnshire, Leicestershire, Nottinghamshire & Derbyshire, North Staffordshire and Monmouthshire, supported by Royal Field Artillery and Royal Engineers.

It was the division's first major action after its arrival on the Western Front but it was a gallant failure. The casualties incurred that afternoon changed forever the fine pre-war territorial character of the division.

The battle took place on the last afternoon of the battle of Loos, some 12 miles to the north, their objective was for "The Hump" an old mine slag heap which controlled the high ground, housing observation posts, machine guns etc.

The battle started with the usual artillery barrage early morning, after a lengthy pause, it was followed later with a gas attack, this proved to be ineffective, once again the high command demanded another pause before the troops went over the top. This gave the Germans the opportunity to occupy their positions ready for the expected attack.

On leaving School, Howard returned to Loughborough and entered the business of William Moss & Sons Limited, Contractors, a firm founded by his grandfather. In August 1914 Howard obtained a commission in the $1/5^{th}$ Leicester Regiment and was attached to the $2/5^{th}$ Battalion at Luton and St Albans, where he was promoted to Lieutenant. Howard was keen for active service and, relinquishing his recent promotion, proceeded to the Front as a 2^{nd} Lieutenant to join the 5^{th} Leicesters. He arrived in France on 24th August 1915 and on the 31st joined "A" Company of his Regiment in the trenches near Kruisstraat in the Ypres Salient.

Letters From The Front

Among the letters to hand this week from Loughborough boys at the front, there is one from Sergeant J. Hudson, of the 2nd Leicesters, who was wounded in Mesopotamia. Prior to sailing for the East he was in France and was wounded at the first outbreak of the war in the autumn of 1914. In describing the battle in which he was wounded he says that Sergeant Cozens, another Loughborough lad, and he were in charge of the same platoon on the day of the attack and before they had gone far someone called to him to take charge as Cozens was hit. As he was leading the attack a curtain of fire came from machine guns, and he was hit near the forehead. Sergeant Hudson, speaking about Private Gibbons of Nanpantan, who fell in the same charge, says that after he was hit he fired every round of ammunition he had left - something like 100 rounds. As soon as he had fired the last round he dropped his rifle and died, never having uttered a word all the time. They were very sorry to lose him, as he was a good soldier. Lieutenant Dowding, another Loughborough man who had risen from the ranks, was also with the Leicesters at the same time. He was killed in the same action, being hit in the forehead. The writer also speaks of Private John Wall having been wounded in the hand.







Loughborough Echo (7 March 2018 Edition)

Loughborough Echo carried a detailed report with all the above details, to coincide with the 100 year anniversary of his death, supplemented by information from regimental diaries. Also reported John's brother Archie served in the Leicestershire Regiment and Royal Tank Corps and survived the war.



War Memorial St.Mary's in Charnwood, Nanpantan



The war memorial sits outside the West end of the church, on the right hand side of the picture.


1923 Shepshed Almanac (author Henry Freeman, Freeman Press).

Hamlet of Nanpantan paid tribute to 7 of 62 who went to war and laid down their lives. Memorial is a large boulder of Forest Rock bearing an inscribed tablet of the fallen. Stone came from a quarry near Longcliffe, given by Messrs Ellis and Everard. Stands on a turf mound by side of mission church unveiled Sunday 7 May by Lt-Col WSN Toller DSO

Originally thought to indicate 7 May 1923, taken from title of the Almanac, however no reference in the Loughborough Echo for 1923. For 7 May to be on a Sunday, 1922 would have to be the year. Date confirmed by the Loughborough Echo 12 May 1922 edition – Memorial Stone unveiled on Sunday 7th May 1922.

Contemporary reports are of a block of Forest rock (5 tons of Granite), supplied by Messer's Everards Longcliffe quarry, on a turf mound.

Longcliffe quarry (Shepshed) dates from 1850. It was purchased in 1891 by Ellis and Everard (owners of Bardon Hill Quarry), along with Newhurst Quarry. In 2014 both quarries are linked and straddle the M1 just South of junction 23. Longcliffe quarry sits on the East side of the M1 (Loughborough side).



Concrete reinforcement to stabilise the rock in the 1970's, according to Roger Webber.

Detail of plaque – according to reports in the Loughborough Echo on unveiling, made of copper, listing 5 names and supplied by Messers Taylor and Sons. Later in the same newspaper report the whole dedication, as below, is reported for 7 men. According to the Loughborough Monitor the tablet is made of bell-metal, cast by Taylors bell founders in Loughborough.

The weathering suggests not pure copper, but some alloy, backing up the bell metal report.



In 2015 the memorial under went further restoration / remedial work, along with the more recent garden of remembrance around its base.

Coverage in the Loughborough Echo

I have consulted the 1914-1919 editions, Jan to Jul 1923 and April/May 1922, for any mentioning of the men named on the Roll of Honour.

The Loughborough Echo format has changed vastly from that published in 2012, but still a weekly publication. In 1914 the front page was situations vacant (jobs) and public notices. Page 2 was a piece of fiction and news as we know it started on page 3. Headlines in the columns are also few and far between so the reader has to be astute as to the change of topic! Sports would be reported inside the back page and "The Shepshed Echo" and village news made up the back page. Historical issues can be viewed on microfilm at Loughborough library. Excerpts reproduced here with permission.

War with Germany commenced after the last edition in July 1914, so there was a lot of catching up on world news in the 7 Aug 1914 edition. Through the autumn / winter of 1914 there was a 2 page spread on "The War in Europe".

From early 1915 coverage was a lot more subdued, maybe censored. News of Loughburians was gleaned from reports of the 5th Battalion of the Leicesters. Occasionally there were letters from named men – censored by the military, of course.


During 1916 conscription started and there were tribunals in Loughborough and villages which heard appeals for men to be exempted war service by their employers. Companies and individual names were omitted from the reports. From the records it seems a few months was given to find a replacement worker at best!

1917 There started to be food shortages and a drive to increase allotments.

1918 Paper shortage saw the Echo reduced to 4 sides and purchasers encouraged to loan to their neighbours their copy! Food was scarcer still with rationing brought in and what seems to be a scarcity of meat. This lack of a good diet may have exacerbated the Oct-Dec 1918 flu epidemic. The Armistice on 11 November is also reported.


1919 The number of pages slowly increases. A number of committees are formed to decide on suitable memorials to the fallen in Loughborough and surrounding villages. Indeed some are in place and unveiled during this year. By May sporting fixtures are again reported for cricket, football and other sports to a lesser extent. Interesting there is no mention of the $1^{\rm st}$ anniversary of the armistice and the reinstated Loughborough fair only gets a brief mention – lamenting the change from hiring fair to fun fair.




4 Sep 1914 more cricket scores




I have consulted the 1914-1918 editions, May 1922, for any mentioning of the men named on the Roll of Honour.

The quality of microfilm was unfortunately a lot poorer too, in the copy at Loughborough Library, many pages out of focus and not re-imaged (including pages containing long lists of those killed and wounded – often including their service number).




21 Oct 1915 Edition HJH Moss Killed in Action







This memorial pays tribute to the Memory of soldiers who Fell in the Nord and in the Pas-de-Calais between 1914 and 1918. The 580,000 names are listed in alphabetical order, without any distinction made between rank or nationality, Former enemies and Friends side by side.

The List of the 294,000 soldiers from the British Empire buried or commemorated in the Nord and in the Pas-de-Calais was provided by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission; this includes English, Scots, Welsh, Irish, Canadians, Australians, New Zealanders, South Africans and Indians.

The Volksbund Deutsche Kriegsgräberfürsorge (Gernan Military Menorial and Var Grave Connission) provided a list of 174,000 Gernans buried in the Nord-Pas-de-Calais, in individual or shared graves; it does not include the names of missing soldiers, which number several tens of thousands.

The List of French soldiers who died in the Nord and in the Pas-de-Calais was drafted on the basis of the List of 'Morts pour La France' (Soldiers who died For France) as issued by the Ministry of DeFence; it includes some 106,000 names, among which are several hundreds of soldiers who fought for the Foreign Legion. The List of 2,300 Belgian soldiers

The List of 2,300 Belgian soldiers was provided by the In Flanders Fields museum in Ypres. The Portuguese Ministry of Defence sent a List of 2,300 soldiers and, Finally, the List also includes Russian and Romanian soldiers (prisoners of war taken by the German army).

This menorial was erected in a peaceful Europe in nenory of a terrible tragedy which devastated a generation of young nen, who for the nost part could read and write.

Narrative description of Nanpantan used Remembrance service 2011 and modified as new information came to hand.

Loughborough / Nanpantan early 1900s

Around 100 years ago Loughborough and environs was very different to today. Loughborough had 4 parishes: All Saints, Holy Trinity, Emmanuel and (according to the 1911 census) newly formed St.Peters. The parish of Emmanuel, covered the South West quadrant of the town, I don't know where the parish boundary was, but I would guess at the A6 through town and Ashby Road. The parish included what we now call Shelthorpe and likely too the Grammar School. Within Emmanuel parish there was a Mission room, in Nanpantan, to serve the farming community there – the building we are in today.

Nanpantan appears to start midway along the road out of Loughborough, which was known as Forest Road all the way out to the Mission room. There was a cluster of houses between where the Post Office is today and Kirkstone Drive on both sides of the road, white houses on the left 282 possibly a coaching inn called "The Dunn Cow" and 290 and Ivanhoe recently restored, you can pick them out guite easily. Valley Road was just a track to Model Farm; Kirkstone Drive was a track to Burleigh Hall with some dwellings around its junction with Forest Road. Next on the right were "The Widenings" still in existence, tall trees guard the private drive between Kirkstone drive and the service road. The next buildings were on the left, Brook Farm and Woodbrook Farm, where the sports ground is, then Parks Farm, Timmy Thomas place. Next we move up the hill, on the right is an alley way formerly the drive to Craggs Farm, then "Forestgate" painted white, opposite it is the Scout hut above which is private residence, that was once an Isolation Hospital and "Marwick Villas". Opposite Marwick Villas is the drive to Burleigh Farm and Nanpantan School, which is now Nanpantan Nursery. As we approach the cross roads, with Snells Nook Lane, there is the water works and reservoir serving the whole town with water, then a row of 6 cottages next to the Longcliffe Hotel, around the corner on Woodhouse Lane there is a house and a row of 4 cottages. Across the road is the entrance to Nanpantan Hall Farm, further down on the same side of the road are some more cottages and then Charnwood Forest Convalescent home.

Back to the cross roads, in the field on the left before the church, there used to be swings and roundabouts, possibly operated by showman. Straight up on the left is the Mission room, with Nanpantan Hall above. Across the road from the Mission room is Cedar House, currently being re-developed.

Back to the cross roads and heading out down Snells Nook Lane we have a few houses including "The Knoll", home to Wilfred Moss a Mayor of Loughborough, then the entrance to Longcliffe Golf Club on the left, before crossing the long abandoned Charnwood Forest canal. The towpath is still a public footpath, linking back to what is Nanpantan Road today. A little further down, on the right, is the track to Holywell Hall and Farm.

It was from this largely farming community of Nanpantan, that men enlisted to serve their country in the Great War in Europe.

Hostilities ended in Europe on the 11^{th} November 1918, but the men did not return, nor memorials appear overnight. Many who served and survived were not demobilised until 1919. The returning men had to cope with all they had seen and encountered for


the rest of their lives. It no doubt took some re-adjusting to civilian life and life back home with their families.

The Roll of Honour was written, to acknowledge those who had served their country at a time of need. With no duplication of names from serving to RIP, it is likely to have been written after hostilities ceased. However omissions it seems occurred, as there are 2 alphabetical listings for those who returned. Some of the listed men had already served in The Boer War and some would go on to answer the call again in World War 2.





1888-1912

- Building of the Nanpantan Mission Room. Builders: W Needham; Architect: AWN Burder; Clerk of Works: Mr Hibbins. Cost £347. Tolling bell 0.3.27 [Hundredweight-Quarters-Pounds] cast by Taylors Bell Founders, diameter of 15 3/16 inches and note of 2364 Hz. First service held on 5th November, 1888
- 1896 Legal Settlement of Mission Room and Premises Trustees: Edward Handley Warner, of Nanpantan Hall, Rev Octavius Glover (Rector of Emmanuel Church), William Berridge, William Clarke and Joseph Frederick Sarjeant
- **1897** Porch built (year of Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee)

1913-1938

- **1915** Christmas parcels of tobacco and cigarettes sent to men from Nanpantan serving in the trenches
- **1919** 34 Returned men of Nanpantan entertained to tea and social. Peace Celebrations
- **1922** Unveiling of War Memorial to seven villagers who were killed during the Great War
- **1923** Troop of Boy Scouts formed
- **1925** A special service was held on Saturday evening 3rd October, at which the Bishop of Peterborough, Cyril Bardsley, preached

- There was much displeasure at the Rector's use of candles on the altar and a special meeting was called
- Bronze tablet unveiled in memory of William Berridge
- A Mothers' Union was formed
- A special service was held on May 12 to celebrate the King's Silver Jubilee of his Coronation
- 1937 An altar table in memory of Mr E Gimson was dedicated by assistant Bishop of Leicester. A stained glass window representing the two mission churches of the parish (Nanpantan Mission Room and the Church of the Good Shepherd at Shelthorpe) was installed at Emmanuel Church

1938-1962

- Golden Jubilee of the Church
- It was agreed to pay £50 for a motor for blowing the organ
- The Gimson family donated a reading desk in memory of Mr L Gimson, and Miss Walmsley gave a credence table
- 1957 The Bishop dedicated and named the Church "The Church of St Mary in Charnwood" and also dedicated a stained glass window to the memory of the late Mrs Isobel Rollier Gimson. It was suggested that ladies could act as sidesmen! A wall had to be repaired due to earthquake damage. New pews were installed. Felt on the organ keys was being eaten by mice
- A fund was started for the new Vestry
- Building of the Vestry completed
- **1961** The Church needed to look to the future with the building of the new estate on Valley Road

1963-1985

- A planned giving scheme was introduced
- 50 new stacking chairs were obtained for the Vestry
- The Priest's Vestry was removed to make more room in the Vestry for the Sunday School
- 1968 The Vestry was burgled and one surplice and cassock was damaged by fire.

 The Senior Sunday School used the old Nanpantan School three Sundays in the month. A new communion service was introduced
- 1969 The induction of the new Rector, Rev Ian Campbell, took place. Rev Ian Campbell became very much more involved in St Mary's than previous Emmanuel Rectors and chaired all meetings
- Bishop Ronald Williams licensed St Mary's for marriages. A special meeting was held to discuss and determine the pattern of services due to changes in the bus service
- The Constitution of the Ecumenical Parish was approved linking Emmanuel, St Mary's, St Peter's, Trinity Methodist and the United Reformed Church

Records are missing between 1973 - 1985

1986-1999

- **1985** Bishop Richard Rutt confirmed that St Mary's should appoint a District Church Council.
- **1987** New owners of Nanpantan Hall relinquished trusteeship of St Mary's
- **1988** Centenary of the Church. Flower Festival
- **1991** St Mary's Ladies Group established. House on Valley Road purchased as St Mary's vicarage with funds raised by the congregation of St Mary's
- **1993** A discussion group for retired men started
- **1994** First women priests ordained in the Diocese. Mobile classroom sited at the back of the vestry for the Sunday School
- **1995** Pastoral Reorganisation Scheme created the Team Ministry. The first Team Vicar of St Mary's was installed. Memorial garden established
- **1997** Vestry garden completed
- 1998 Interregnum due to sudden resignation of the Vicar. Rev Sue Field appointed Team Vicar. The new owner of Nanpantan Hall gave ownership and maintenance of the surrounding wood to the Church
- **1999** Flower Festival. Chapter House building project completed

2000-2015

- **2000** Special service to mark the Millenium. New car park layout
- **2001** St Mary's in the top 12 in the Best Kept Churchyard competition
- **2002** Flower Festival. Damage to woodland by violent storm
- **2003** Use of Chapter House increased
- **2004** Church Christmas card produced. Sue Field installed as Honorary Canon of Leicester Cathedral and Director of Ordinands
- **2005** Congregation responded to help Sue Field as her time was more restricted. Flower Festival. Chapter House decorated
- 2007 New ventures Breathe, Messy Play, Worship with a Classical Flavour, Back to Church Sunday. Grant of £3,000 from Helen Jean Cope Trust towards new piano
- 2008 Flower Festival
- **2009** First music festival. Pastoral Assistant appointed. Auction of Promises raised £2,807. Woodland managements and gardens continued regularly with a quiet area created
- 2010 More emphasis on outreach. Teams of stewards appointed to help welcome at weddings and funerals and one person to work with baptism families started. Parish Bereavement Team established and links with Longcliffe Nursing Home strengthened
- **2011** Music Festival and Flower Festival. Legacy received from Dan & Lilian Bloor. Table Talk, a monthly lunch, was started for gentlemen living on their own
- 2012 Sunday services held at The Priory during major re-ordering of the chancel area and total refurbishment of the Church. Thanksgiving service led by Bishop Tim Stevens. Pipe organ removed. New internal doors. Midweek monthly service started. Damage caused due to break-in. Bell frame and fittings overhauled
- **2015** From the 1st January, St. Mary in Charnwood became a standalone parish

Insufficient volunteers came forth, so conscription was introduced by the Military Service Act of January 1916. This Act rendered liable for service all men **18 to 41**, and this extended to married men after May 1916. In April 1918, the age limit was extended to **51**

There are no records pertaining to servants at Nanpantan Hall or Burleigh Hall in their archive.

Hold, but not consulted, a National Health and Insurance and Unemployment Stamp Account book for Loughborough Cemetery, 1912-1925, which was run by Loughborough and Nanpantan Burial Board and there is a gardeners' wage book for Beaumanor Park, 1915-1925 [ref DE4449/11 and 16].

1939 Register

The 1939 Register was taken on the outbreak of the Second World War. The data collected included: the names; addresses; martial statuses and occupation of every person in the country. Each individual then received identity cards. The register was maintained for identity cards up to 1952 and was then used by the NHS. As the register was maintained, female entries were updated with change of surname by marriage. Persons who were not noted as deceased, when the register stopped being updated, are visible; but all other persons calculated as <100 years old, are "officially closed" and their entry redacted.
